
LifeGroup Sermon Series Study 2021-2022 Series Seven



"Enemies of the Cross"



The last two years our lives have been dramatically changed. We have experienced pressures, emotional difficulties, and death without our normal support groups. We have also experienced unprecedented division, hatred, and violet conflict. This environment has caused people to seek shelter in many different ways – some good and some bad.

Four desires have emerged in our American culture that people are using to try and cope. These desires were here before the pandemic but have dramatically increased with all the anxiety provoking trauma.

The four coping desires are the desire for comfort, control, approval, and power. These desires conflict with what Jesus asks of us when following Him. In fact, in many cases the desires, when embraced, make it very difficult for us to follow and rely upon Jesus. The desire for comfort places our confidence in physical circumstances. The desire for control places our confidence in our ability to handle the circumstances and people around us. The desire for approval places our confidence in what other people think about us. The desire for power places our confidence in position and influence.

We are putting "the desire" in the position that Jesus should occupy; and comfort, control, approval, and/or power become our gods. Living with these desires, we soon realize they are a shallow impersonation of what we are really looking for and the disconnect creates a crisis in our lives. A relationship with Jesus is what we are all seeking and the only thing that will provide security, confidence, and peace.

In this series, we will look at four biblical examples where people bought into the lies these desires produce and we will see how Jesus dealt with and redirected each situation.

Don't allow for these desires, these enemies of the cross, to creep into your lives and destroy what God wants to do in your life.

"Enemies of the Cross" – A Desire for Comfort Luke 9:57-58 Lesson 1

III. Community that Understands the Background:

Jesus' appeal to follow Him was never a big sell job. He was honest, realistic, and set the expectations high. This first man approached Jesus and told Him that he would follow Jesus wherever He went. Jesus offered the man some very important advice, making sure the man understood that following Jesus would cost the man a comfortable life.

Jesus doesn't tell the man he can't follow, He just showed him what the life would look like. In the context of Jesus' response, He didn't say He was poor, but homeless. Jesus trusted God for every material thing He needed. He taught us not to worry about clothing, food, or drink because God would supply them. We are to seek His kingdom first.

Jesus told the man that foxes have holes in the ground that they live in. Birds have nests made of twigs and feathers to live in. The "Big Fox" in Luke 13:32 refers to King Herod. The birds that Jesus speaks of are people who are poor and insignificant, but God still cares for them (Matthew 5). Jesus had no place to call home. He had no security a home provides. He had no comfort of a home. He lived on the road sleeping on the ground, under the skies, and in the harsh elements of weather and threat.

I. Purpose:

Jesus' words to this man seem very harsh but the point is made clear. Following Jesus must be the priority; it cannot be an "addon" or an "extra thing." Jesus was telling the man that the time was now. He needed to act now, or he never would.

Luke doesn't tell us if the man's father was dead or not. It is likely that he was still alive because, if he had died, the son would have been involved in preparing funeral arrangements. Most likely this man's father was terminally ill and was about to die.

Maybe this man wanted to follow Jesus, but he wasn't ready to give up control yet and was using his father's impending death as an excuse. Jesus isn't saying to neglect our family responsibilities but when Jesus calls us, true discipleship requires immediate action. Giving up control involves allowing God to be in control of the timetable.

A third man came to see Jesus and said that he would follow Jesus, but he had to go back to say goodbye to his family. We do not know why the man needed to say his farewells. Maybe it was because he wanted permission, or he wanted to be appreciated, or maybe he wanted his family to celebrate him for what he was about to do. Whatever the reason, it was standing in the way of following Jesus.

Once again Jesus is teaching that nothing, absolutely nothing, can get in the way of Jesus' call on our lives. Then Jesus gives us a very practical example for what seeking approval does to us. It is impossible to plow a field straight if we are looking backward. Sometimes we get caught focusing on the wrong thing. When we focus on the wrong thing, our path will not be straight.

When we get too consumed with looking good, being politically correct, and having people agree with us, we are not focused ahead to where Jesus is. Sometimes following Jesus is a lonely journey where the only approval that matters is our Savior Jesus Christ's approval.

III. Community that Understands the Background:

The most power-hungry people in the gospels were religious leaders. They had power, privilege, and position. Jesus was a threat to all that. He had the ability to disturb the balance of power that the religious leaders had with their own people and with the Romans.

In the middle of an exchange with the religious leaders, Jesus told a parable that the religious leaders understood clearly. It was customary to send two invitations to a party. The first was to announce the event (so that people could save the date and the exact time was unknown). The second invitation was to tell the guests that everything was ready and that they could attend. In Jesus' story, the invited guests had accepted the first invitation but offered excuses for the second.

The hidden meaning (directed to the religious leaders) was that the first invitation from God was to Moses and the prophets. The Jews and the religious leaders accepted the first invitation, but they rejected the second. The second invitation was to accept Jesus. The religious leaders rejected the second invitation because it would cost them their position and power.
