

"Truth..."

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"Truth…" Why Do Bad Things Happen to Godly People? Job 1:1-2:10 Lesson 1

I. Purpose:

Job is a man who was right with God. He is described as a man who was blameless and upright. Job also saw the financial blessing from God. He was extremely wealthy and had a large family, but he experienced some very difficult days. He experienced the loss of children, loss of his wealth, loss of friendship, and loss of personal health. He basically lost everything.

His friends and his wife blamed him for these difficulties. They said he was the cause of God's wrath. His friends and his wife's philosophy was that good things happen to good people and bad things happen to bad people. They felt like their role was to get Job to confess his sin so that things could get back to "normal". Job felt very similar to his friends and his wife, but the difference was that he could not figure out what he had done wrong. He looked at his life and could not find what he had done to deserve such punishment.

What made things even worse was that God was silent during this time. When God finally did speak, he didn't offer Job any answers. God told Job that it was better to know God than to know answers.

God eventually restored Job, restored his wealth, and restored his family.

This lesson looks at the Satanic attack in spiritual warfare and what we should know about the attack and how to overcome it. May we remember Job the next time we experience difficulty.

"Truth..." Why Doesn't God Do Something...Say Yes? Il Corinthians 12:7-10 Lesson 2

I. Purpose:

Paul was a very talented guy. He had a superstar background with his training, his experience as a Pharisee, and his background. He was a leader. He was accomplishing a lot. He loved a challenge. He made things happen. He also had a dramatic salvation experience where Jesus appeared to him personally to confront him. He had experienced visions and revelations from God. He also wrote a majority of the New Testament under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit.

If there was anyone who could have pride it was Paul. But Paul knew how foolish that would be. The reason he knew how foolish it would be to bring glory to himself is because of the "thorn" he had. No one knows what that thorn was. Everyone could see his "thorn" in the flesh. But nothing is written to describe what it specifically was. The root word that is used here is a tent stake. It can mean "something which frustrates and causes trouble in the lives of those afflicted".

Over and over again Paul asked God to take away his "thorn" but God's answer was "my grace is sufficient". Paul did exactly what he told others to do, pray. But God's answer was "no". The grace that God gave Paul was sufficient for Paul to deal with his thorn.

That sufficiency Paul received when he acknowledged how weak he was and how much he needed God.

"Truth…" Is the Bible Reliable and Can It Be Trusted? II Timothy 3:16-17 Lesson 3

I. Purpose:

- A. To help us understand why the Bible is reliable.
- B. To help us know what the purpose of the Bible is.
- C. To help us see that the Bible is the creditable authoritative Word of God.

III. Community that Understands the Background:

Have you ever wondered how you can know that the Bible can be trusted? Have you ever wondered which versions can be trusted and which ones cannot? Have you ever wondered why the Bible is so special? These are all good and appropriate questions.

The Bible was written according to Timothy under divine inspiration. But which scriptures was Paul writing about? In Jesus' day the Old Testament was already established. It was already accepted that the 39 books of the Old Testament made up the Old Testament. Even Jesus quoted from the Old Testament. By the 2nd century, the 27 New Testament books were already chosen and accepted by the church at the time. It was confirmed by counsels what was already accepted.

Virtually every ancient writing that has survived is a result of later copies. This is mostly due to what manuscripts were written on at the time. To preserve a manuscript, it would need to be copied every 50-100 years. Obviously the closer the copy was written to when the original manuscript was written, the more reliable it was. There are no original existing manuscripts of the Bible but there are around 24,000 copies with some being from as early as the 2nd century. If a variant could be found, it could be crosschecked by other

manuscripts. If a newer manuscript had a variant, then it could be crosschecked with an older manuscript. The ability to crosscheck manuscripts gives the ability to know that the teaching is the same as when it was first spoken. In final analysis, the manuscripts from the Bible have no major variants just minor grammatical errors and none of those errors change the meaning of the passage. The conclusion is that our scriptures are reliable and can be trusted.

"Truth…" How Can Jesus be the Only Way? John 14:6 Lesson 4

I. Purpose:

Don't you think that the claim by Jesus as being the only way to God is a little arrogant? How could someone make a claim like this? Jesus seemed so unlikely to be the only way to God. He was a carpenter's son, not from a special religious family, and he was poor.

I hear this argument all the time. The claim of being the only way to God is in the midst of a three-fold claim. Jesus said that He was the only way, He was the only absolute truth, and He was the only eternal life. All other ways were imposters. All through the Old Testament we see God commanding His people to have only one God. That they only obey one truth. That they only believe in one life. So this claim was consistent with what the Jews believed.

But to say that Jesus was the way, truth, and life was one of the most controversial statements Jesus ever made and all gospel writers recorded it. This was the Messiah, God himself in the flesh, who made the claim that He was the only way to God. To find that the only way, the only truth, and the only life is through Jesus makes sense for God to claim.

"Truth..." Is Christianity/God Homophobic? Genesis 2:18, 20b-25 Lesson 5

I. Purpose:

- A. To help us understand why the Bible condemns homosexuality.
- B. To help us know why it is not a political argument.

Aren't homosexuals born this way? Isn't a homosexual marriage acceptable to God? Isn't it wrong to tell someone that a homosexual lifestyle is wrong? Isn't that "hate" speech? How can God not be ok with homosexuals? Does the Bible really condemn homosexuality?

I get asked these questions all the time. There is so much misunderstanding about what the Bible says about homosexuality. Everything that is written in the Bible about homosexuality applies both to Christians and non-Christians. First, God created men and women so the man would leave his father and mother to be united with his wife according to Genesis 2. God created Adam out of the dust. God created Eve from a rib out of Adam. It was distinct and unique like our chromosomes are distinct and unique. Men and women had different roles but were partners. God created woman to be an appropriate partner because it wasn't good for Adam to be alone.

God used man's body to create a woman because it was a reminder of the oneness that men and women could experience in marriage. Adam, when he saw Eve, acknowledged that Eve was like him, "bone of my bones", and not like him, "taken out of man". They were one but not the same. God said His creation was very good.

But He also said that homosexuality was a distortion of His original plan. He called it detestable in Leviticus. There is no doubt that the Hebrew statement is literally talking about homosexuality. The word "detestable" in the Hebrew is one of the strongest words of condemnation in the entire language. It was such a serious violation that it was punishable by death according to Jewish law. People try to say that the words "lie with a man as one lies with a woman" is not talking about homosexuality but that simply is not true. Paul said in I Corinthians that men who have sex with men will not inherit the kingdom of God. He once again is speaking of homosexuality.

"Truth…" Is Abortion Really Murder? Psalm 139:13-16 Lesson 6

I. Purpose:

- A. To help us understand that life begins at conception.
- B. To help us know that God is intimately involved in our creation.

III. Community that Understands the Background:

The battle over abortion rights has been around since the Roe verses Wade decision happened in 1973. In 2022, the abortion debate has heated up again. There is probably no hotter subject on the political landscape. We have seen both sides aggressively battling each other for years. But what does the Bible say about abortion? What does God say about when life begins? How should Christians respond to this political debate?

The Bible teaches that life begins in the womb. It doesn't state it begins after birth or after so many weeks in the womb. The basic principle that the Bible gives is that life begins in the womb. Isaiah 44:24 says, "This is what the Lord says -- your Redeemer, who formed you in the womb: I am the Lord, who has made all things...". Also, in Exodus 21:22, "If two men who are fighting hit a pregnant woman and she gives birth prematurely...and there is serious injury, you are to take life for life...". There is no minimum time in the womb to consider the baby "life". According to Luke 1:41-44, when Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting her baby leaped in her womb.

God is very clear in His Word that God considers life to begin at conception. From a biblical perspective one cannot arrive at any

other conclusion. God has a plan for that life. God is positioning that person for His purposes. When we choose abortion, we are impacting God's ideas, plans, and purposes. So, if life begins at conception, then ending that life is murder.
